
Francis Edwin "Eddie"

the refreshments, too.




Gabby Franklin participated remotely via photo sent with her human, Chrys. "You know how uncivilized canines can be in crowds," Gabby explained.

Introducing: Trey West UPUMC's Director of Communications

Trey West came to UPUMC's Communications Department in June of this year. He does not characterize himself as the director of a department, however. He thinks of his position as ministry, and you will soon find out why.

Trey was born in Snellville, Georgia, northeast of Atlanta. The youngest of three children, he moved with his family when he was only six months old to Birmingham, Alabama. Along with his brother and sister, Trey grew up in a deeply religious family who belonged to the Assembly of God Church. He describes his home church as "Wesleyan Pentecostal" because of its grace-based theology.

Throughout his elementary years, he attended a private Christian school, then a public high school in Alabaster, a suburb of Birmingham. His mother had trained in vocal performance, but Trey was the only one of her children who inherited her love for and dedication to singing. His tenor voice earned him a place in multiple church and school choirs during his formative years. When it was time to enter college, however, he had set his sights on becoming a lawyer, so he opted to major in Political Science. Before he went off to the University of Montevallo, however, Trey's high school choir director talked him into a double major: Political Science and Vocal Performance!

After just a few short months into his first semester at UM, Trey knew he wanted to major exclusively in music. He dropped the Political Science major and focused solely on Vocal Performance, all the while taking classes in conducting and assisting his college choir director. During his undergraduate studies, his college choir director convinced him to pursue a future in choral conducting. This led to Texas for the first time when he moved here to pursue a Masters in Choral Conducting at Texas A&M University-Commerce.

After grad school, Trey served at Christ UMC in Plano for 3 years. Their long-time Music Director, Pat Messick, became his mentor, convincing Trey that he was called into full-time ministry. In 2015, Trey assumed the role of Director of Music and Worship at Keller UMC. After three wonderful years, he had an opportunity to join the staff of Dauphin Way UMC in Mobile, Alabama, and be closer to family in Alabama.

In 2019, Becca and Trey married here in Texas, but stayed in Alabama for three more years. During that time, Trey began to feel drawn toward a different, albeit related, kind of ministry. He was beginning to discern why he felt more drawn toward church communications at that point in his career. He reflected how passionately he felt that the primary message of churches: love, acceptance, belonging, welcome -- was not being communicated effectively, despite the best intentions of most houses of worship. So, when he was offered a position as Director of Communications at First Methodist Carrollton, the Wests moved back "home" to Texas.

Trey was excited to have a hand in ALL the ministries in a church because he was articulating their message in new exciting ways to reach the congregation and the wider community.

When First Carrollton's congregation voted to disaffiliate, however, Trey decided to resign. The staff and congregants were very gracious about his decision. And the Holy Spirit must have been at work, because the very next day, he read the announcement of UPUMC's opening for a Communications Director. And the rest, as they say, is history!

The Wests live in The Colony. Becca teaches sixth-grade math at Rice Middle School in Plano ISD (the same middle school she actually attended!) They are fortunate to parent the best dog in the Metroplex: Eddie West!
