
#### Spotlight on UPUMC Staff (continued)

### Spotlight on UPUMC Staff: Jim Mabile

Jim Mabile was born in a Memphis, Tennessee hospital. His family attended one of the city's large Southern Baptist churches, so he grew up in that tradition. During his boyhood, Jim loved to play sports of all kinds. But it wasn't until he went to Memphis State University that he started running track and cross-country.

At Memphis State, thinking he would go to medical school, Jim majored in Biology. After two years, he changed his mind about the profession but kept his major; he branched out by minoring in Math, Industrial Engineering, and Classical Languages.



After graduation and a tour of duty in the Navy Reserve, Jim returned to Memphis and accepted a sales position with Allied Chemical Corporation. During that time, he met his wife one afternoon when he was on his way to the hospital to see his terminally ill dentist, but impulsively stopped by the home of some friends where Carole was visiting. It must have been kismet, because Carole also happened to be the head nurse on Jim's dentist's floor. They went out that evening and every evening over the next two months before Jim proposed. Carole and Jim have been married for 54 years. They have a son, Chris, a daughter, Reagan, and two grandchildren.

Jim left Allied Chemical for a division of Johnson & Johnson called Ethicon, Inc., manufacturer of sutures and other wound closure products. Jim loved working with the OR nurses and physicians in hospitals. He was promoted seven times during his 15-year stint with Ethicon. As he climbed the ladder, the Mabiles moved from Nashville to New Orleans to New Jersey and then Dallas to open a new regional office. Again, Jim was promoted back to the home office; but having developed a love for Dallas, he commuted from Texas to the East Coast for six months before accepting an offer from a Dallas firm. He left Ethicon with an unmatched record, one that included Man of the Year, Division and Region of the Year, and sales and management achievements in cardiovascular, opththalmic, and neurological surgery.

During Jim's weekly commute to New York, a neighbor had told him he should stay in Texas and meet a gentleman he knew. That gentleman turned out to be Trammell Crow. After meetings with Crow and his senior partners, Jim joined the firm as National Marketing Director and later became Vice President of Marketing and firm Partner. He spent the next five years learning real estate development, particularly during trips with Trammell to New York and Boston. He also learned how to develop strong relationships with Fortune 200 firms. All this experience propelled Jim to start his own company when the Trammel Crow partnerships were falling apart.

Jim formed Mabile-Carter & Company in Dallas, followed by Mabile-Carter, LLC Atlanta and Grupo Mabile de Mexico in Monterrey, Mexico. These firms provided Fortune 200 and international firms with facility and operations planning, real estate, architecture and construction services. After over two decades in this venture and projects in all but five US states, the Caribbean, Mexico, and the Panama Canal Zone, Jim retired.

Since he left Ethicon and settled in Texas, something had begun to stir deep inside Jim's soul. He explains it as a kind of "mellowing," a stepping away from his previous 'Type A' personality, and the beginning of his faith journey. Although Carole and Jim lived in Plano, they moved their membership to FUMC Dallas. There, in a class with Rev. Wally Chappell, the group read Marcus Borg's book: *Reading the Bible Again for the First Time*. For Jim, it was a turning point. After that, Carole and Jim completed all the Disciple Bible Studies offered at First Church, along with a few friends. When their small group had finished all the courses, they decided to start their own Sunday School class, which is still in existence today -- and growing.
